

Creating Spring Tree

I repeat the process of cutting the fabric into small pieces and reconnecting them. It is a process of separating and reconnecting myself with the world.

The small pieces of fabric become coloured dots and cover the cotton fabric support. I layer coloured threads on these coloured dots to enrich the sense of colour. One of my previous tree quilts, Always There, (on page 18) featured a large and strong tree, started with a longing heart because my parents had passed away. It symbolises them, and by expressing it as a large tree with lush leaves, I expressed the love that parents have for their children.

This Spring Tree expressed my children who grew up in that love. And when I finished the work and looked at it, I realised that it was also a spring tree trying to become stronger – me too.
